## Schedule Bulky Service For Your Tenant's Move Out

Help keep our streets clean by scheduling a drop off and/or a curbside pickup appointment for residents moving out.\*

\*Costs to provide bulky pickup and drop off service are included in your property's trash rates. One curbside pickup and one drop off per unit are provided for no additional cost each year.



### DROP OFF

Schedule an appointment to bring up to 4 cubic yards of bulky waste to the Davis Street Resource Recovery Complex in San Leandro.



### CURBSIDE PICKUP

Schedule a convenient bulky curbside appointment, where residents can set out up to 4 cubic yards of bulky waste plus a limited number of larger items like mattresses, TVs, and tires.

## Holiday Trash Spike - Plan Ahead

The amount of waste generated between Thanksgiving and New Year's increases by 25%. Plan ahead to ensure you have space to put your trash. **Add an extra trash pickup day** for the month of December for the extra waste your residents will generate. Below are other ways to manage extra trash at your property.



### Extra Pickup

Call WMAC at 510-613-8700 for an extra pickup when you see your trash containers ready to overflow.



### Schedule Bulky Junk Service

Schedule a bulky junk service, pick up and drop off appointment (See above). This service is for property managers and tenants.



### Free Mattress Drop Off

Drop off up to five mattresses or box springs a day for free at the Davis Street Resource Recovery Complex, 2615 Davis Street San Leandro, CA 94577

Sat: 8:00 am - 4:00 pm

## Do the chasing arrows and numbers on the bottom of a plastic container mean it belongs in your recycle cart?

No. In Oakland we recycle hard plastic containers shaped like jugs, tubs, or bottles. Plastic containers in these shapes are typically made from plastic #1 (bottles), #2 (jugs), and #5 (tubs).

You will see other plastic items in your home with chasing arrows on them, but please put them in the trash. The chasing arrows symbol on plastic with a number located in the center of it communicates what type of plastic resin the product is made from. It does not mean that the plastic item is recyclable. California law makers agree that the chasing arrows are confusing to the public. New laws will change how companies label their packaging in the future.

For now- recycle your #1 (bottles), #2 (jugs), and #5 (tubs) and trash the rest.



## COMPOST TIPS

### What is stopping you from sorting food scraps?

Keeping food scraps out of the trash and placing them in the compost cart helps reduce methane gas emissions that come from decaying organic material in the landfill. Sometimes separating food scraps can cause your container to become odorous and messy. Below are a few tips to manage the “ick” factor to help you keep sorting those food scraps.

- Place shredded paper or cardboard at bottom of containers.
- Place food scraps in a paper bag first, then toss into green compost cart.
- Reduce food waste, only buy what you eat. Visit <https://stopfoodwaste.org> for tips to maximize your food budget through planning, proper storage, and creativity.

## Can You Throw that Light Bulb Away?

Most light bulbs these days are **LED or fluorescent** and should **stay out of the trash**. Broken bulbs can release mercury or heavy metals like arsenic and lead into the air and water. This includes fluorescent tubes, compact fluorescent lamps, metal halide lamps, and sodium vapor lamps. See below for disposal options.

**Standard incandescent** light bulbs **can be thrown in the trash**. These types of bulbs hold no toxic materials.
